Today, that single home that provided the foundation for Episcopal Retirement Homes has grown into two continuing care retirement communities, four affordable housing communities and three community services that help seniors live with the purpose, choice and freedom they deserve. Inside this Annual Report issue of Linkage magazine, we look back on how far we have come, including some of the major achievements of the past year.

In 2010, ERH continued to excel despite the ongoing uncertainty of the economy and a highly competitive marketplace. Building a strong foundation

In 1951, a coalition of generous Cincinnatians provided housing and care for 20 elderly ladies in Clifton through the Memorial Homes Foundation. Compassionate caregivers created a welcome, caring environment and highlighted a community need. Their small but determined effort created the basis for today's Episcopal Retirement Homes.



2010 Ministry Report

Not-for-profit organizations have a rich tradition of providing services and programs that directly benefit the communities and constituents they serve. Since its inception in 1951, Episcopal Retirement Homes (ERH) has been reaching out through its mission to improve the lives of older adults who are at risk of being underserved.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Residents of ERH communities know they will never be asked to leave if they fall on hard financial times. Contributions to the Good Samaritan Mission Fund allow ERH to make that promise. ERH helps in other ways, too. The Partners in Care Fund helps residents pay for items such as eyeglasses or hearing aids that their insurance may not cover. Upon receiving financial assistance for a hearing aid, one resident said, "I am so thankful. Now I get to enjoy the sounds and people around me so much more."

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

ERH works to ensure that residents of its affordable housing communities have more than just the basics required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Partnerships assist ERH with that goal—assistance from St. Patrick's in Dublin, Ohio, resulted in a pool table finding a home with the residents of ERH's Cambridge Heights community. Cambridge Heights also received a wellness grant to assist residents' needs. And at Canterbury Court, St. Paul's Episcopal Church in West Carrollton provides chaplaincy services in a partnership with ERH.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Part of the ERH commitment to be good community stewards involves outreach through a variety of programs. Each year at Christmas, ERH residents, volunteers and staff collect toys and monetary donations to benefit families living in Martin's Ferry, Ohio, an area hit hard by years of economic strife.

ERH also added a new community outreach ministry in 2010: the Council on Life Long Engagement (CLLE). CLLE partnered with the Nativity of Our Lord School in Pleasant Ridge to share the talents and experiences of our residents with students. "This has been so enlightening for our students," one teacher said of the experience. "They see history brought to life through the stories of elders who have experienced things firsthand."
