Thanks to our dedicated team members, generous supporters, and strategic partnerships, we not only sustained our work—we expanded our reach in meaningful ways.

Here is a preview of this year's Ministry Report:

- **Center for Memory Support and Inclusion (CMSI):** In 2024, we reached more individuals outside of our communities' walls, living with cognitive loss and their care partners. CMSI's Songs In Mind program grew through our partnership with Keys for Success, whose music therapist helped lead our annual choir and final performance in December. This free program welcomes all and provides a joyful, engaging space for everyone involved.
 - **Deupree Meals on Wheels (MOW):** Our Swipe 'N' Dine program expanded our Meals on Wheels impact by partnering with local restaurants to offer free, nutritious meals to low-income older adults. Funded by the Council on Aging, it promotes dignity, social connection, and well-being—serving more than meals by fostering community collaboration across Cincinnati.
 - **Affordable Living by ERS:** In 2024, we advanced our mission through housing, creativity, and community outreach. We prepared for the 2025 opening of Pedretti Place, Delhi Township's first new affordable senior housing in 45 years. At Westminster Court, our Women in Leadership Affinity Group honored residents with handmade artwork. Lastly, we highlight several community outreach efforts in which residents and staff united to serve others with compassion and purpose.
 - **We Can Do Better:** In its fifth year, we held the Lifting Up Voices From Within event, honoring our Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) nurses and advancing diversity in healthcare. Led by ERS' BIPOC Affinity Group, the evening included a screening of "Breaking the Silence: A Black Nursing Documentary" and a moving panel featuring ERS nurses. ERS continues to lead with purpose through inclusive initiatives like the Lauren Brown Empowerment Fund and others.
- These stories serve as a reflection of the impact we can make together. Thank you for walking alongside us and helping us continue to bring dignity, compassion, and connection to those we serve.

A Community of Compassion

The philanthropic support of donors to Episcopal Retirement Services (ERS) has been vital to the fulfillment of our mission to serve older adults in a person-centered, innovative, and spiritually based way.

Since the 1950s, philanthropists have followed the lead of ERS founders Charles and Marjorie P. Lee. During uncertain times, they have ensured that we have the resources needed to enable those we serve to live with dignity and purpose regardless of their ability to pay. As we continue to stabilize, sustain, and grow our organization, this strong legacy of charitable giving and volunteering is what

steers the ministries of ERS. Collectively, ERS' Good Samaritan Mission Fund (GSM)

and The Promise Fund of Episcopal Church Home (ECH) provided \$2.69M in annual charitable support. Thanks to these funds, no resident at Deupree House and Cottages, Marjorie P. Lee, or ECH has to leave their home if they run out of funds through no fault of their own.

The GSM also helps to provide essential resources to reach thousands of older adults residing in our Affordable Living communities and receiving community.

Resident Financial Aid fulfills the ERS promise that no ECH, Deupree House, or Marjorie P. Lee resident who has outlived his or her resources will ever be required to leave for financial reasons.

\$1.24M

Affordable Living by ERS serves lower-income older adults, empowering them to live independently with dignity and enjoy safe, enriched lives regardless of their financial situation. We provide them rent-subsidized living that includes a variety of options and services.

\$276,159

Spiritual Care serves the spiritual needs of residents and their families, regardless of their denomination. An integral part of ERS living, it includes staff chaplains and partnerships with neighborhood clergy and lay volunteers.

\$78,053

The Staff Assistance Fund provides financial aid to our most valuable resource, our dedicated staff, through tuition assistance and emergency relief.



\$33,652

Volunteer Coordinators empower Deupree House and Marjorie P. Lee residents to serve in a variety of capacities, including leadership roles. This is within our communities and through outreach programs that positively impact the lives of all those served.

\$22,250

Community Outreach Programs promote healthy and fulfilling aging by sharing the expertise of ERS team members, residents, and volunteers. ERS also supports worthy organizations through philanthropic contributions.

\$2,351

Partners In Care Fund improves the lives of ERS residents, giving them comfort and meeting basic daily needs. It provides items such as durable medical equipment, prescription medication, furnishings, and necessary services not covered by insurance.

We Can Do Better



One of our We Can Do Better efforts, “Lifting Up Voices From Within,” highlighted the inspiring stories of Black nurses at ERS.

Lifting Up Voices from Within

Our Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) Affinity Group held “Lifting Up Voices From Within,” an impactful event that drew more than 130 attendees to Memorial Hall.

The goals were to educate, celebrate, and inspire. We screened “Breaking the Silence: A Black Nursing Documentary,” about systemic racism in nursing education. We honored our Black and Brown nurses, who make up 58% of the nursing team at our three retirement communities. We also encouraged staff to envision a nursing career at Episcopal Retirement Services, using resources from our We Can Do Better (WCDB) program.

After the event, several team members have requested information about advancing their nursing careers. One team member shared, “I love working at ERS. It is exciting to think about how I can continue to grow and serve our residents.”

WCDB launched in 2020 after the tragic killings of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery, and Breonna Taylor. In our grief, and recognizing the impact on staff and residents, we felt a responsibility to act. Inspired by Maya Angelou’s words— “Do the best you can until you know better. Then, when you know better, do better.”—We committed to a journey of listening, learning, and growing together.

Serving More Than Meals: Local Restaurants Help Swipe 'N' Dine Grow

The Swipe 'N' Dine (SND) program, a part of our Deupree Meals On Wheels, is expanding through strong partnerships with local restaurants. Marx Bagels, Red Squirrel, Imperial Wok, and Perkins Restaurant are among the latest to join the effort, helping older adults with limited incomes access nutritious meals at a reduced cost.

Beyond the food, the program offers a valuable social outlet. Participants are encouraged to dine in and enjoy companionship in a warm, welcoming setting. These partnerships help break down barriers to both nutrition and social connection, promoting dignity and well-being for individuals who may otherwise face food insecurity.

A Healing Tune

*How Marjorie P. Lee helped a lifelong musician
get back to what he loves.*

Ron, a jazz musician, UC grad, and retired P&G engineer, had no plans to slow down in 2024. After 75 years leading bands in Cincinnati, a hip fracture threatened to end his rhythm. He turned to Marjorie P. Lee's (MPL) short-term rehab team to regain strength and returned home in time for his 90th birthday. A second hip fracture brought him back to MPL, where his positivity and determination inspired staff and residents alike.

Thanks to expert care, Ron is back doing what he loves—leading his 17-piece big band and small combo, performing 10 to 15 times a month. Now, he often returns to MPL not as a patient, but as a performer and friend. “He lights up a room—in therapy and on stage,” said Mindy Sims, MPL care transition coordinator. His concerts are a joyful tribute to the place that helped him heal.

The Women in Leadership Affinity Group hosted its first in-person event, Paint & Sip, in November 2024. In partnership with Sara Mays and Bona Kim of ATA Beilharz Architects, the group created a painted quilt to display in one of our Affordable Living communities.

Held at Madison Villa, a community designed by ATA-Beilharz, the event welcomed 31 women. Each participant painted a quilt square. Sara and Bona also shared their

experiences as women in the traditionally male-dominated field of architecture.

Staff from Westminster Court II in Blanchester, Ohio, spoke about the renovation's impact on residents. The finished quilt will be displayed near the entrance to the resident lounge at Westminster Court II.

It was a meaningful evening—a testament to women coming together to support their communities.

There's No Place Like Home

Residents of St. Paul Village return home after an unexpected act of God temporarily moved them out of the campus.

After 13 months of displacement, residents of St. Paul Village were welcomed home. In December 2022, a winter storm forced a full evacuation and remodel. In true ERS fashion, staff across the organization supported residents through an “adopt-a-resident” initiative, donating 50 welcome baskets—kitchen and bathroom-themed—to help them settle back into their homes.



Always Supporting the Surrounding Community



At Canterbury Court, residents and staff collected school supplies over the summer and partnered with the Church of the Lost and Found to pack backpacks for children in need at West Carrollton Schools. The Canterbury team is always looking for ways to support the surrounding community.

Teddy Bears Hugs for All

In June, Prairie Oaks Village hosted its second annual Teddy Bear Give Back event. Wilmington's police and fire chiefs accepted stuffed animals to comfort children

experiencing trauma from accidents, domestic violence, or emergencies. With ongoing community needs, residents and staff have already begun collecting for next year.



Stepping up for a Cause

Episcopal Church Home (ECH) made a strong return to Louisville's Walk to End Alzheimer's this fall, raising over \$1,800 for critical research. More than 20 residents, staff, and community members attended the event, hosted by the Alzheimer's Association of Greater Kentucky and Indiana. Their enthusiastic participation showcased ECH's

ongoing commitment to supporting the 7 million Americans living with Alzheimer's. The walk, which raised a total of \$420,000, highlighted the power of community in driving awareness and change. ECH's presence brought hope and visibility to the cause, reminding us that meaningful impact begins with unified effort—one step at a time.



The Best of Holiday Treats

The Center for Memory Support and Inclusion (CMSI), an outreach ministry of ERS, fosters dementia-inclusive environments by creating welcoming spaces for individuals living with dementia and their care partners. Since its launch in 2020, CMSI has offered support, education, and social engagement in collaboration with community partners.

In partnership with the Giving Voice Foundation and Catholic Charities of Southwestern Ohio, CMSI hosted its annual holiday celebration. The event featured a choral concert by Songs In Mind, a dementia-friendly choir led by a music therapist from Keys for Success. Participants and

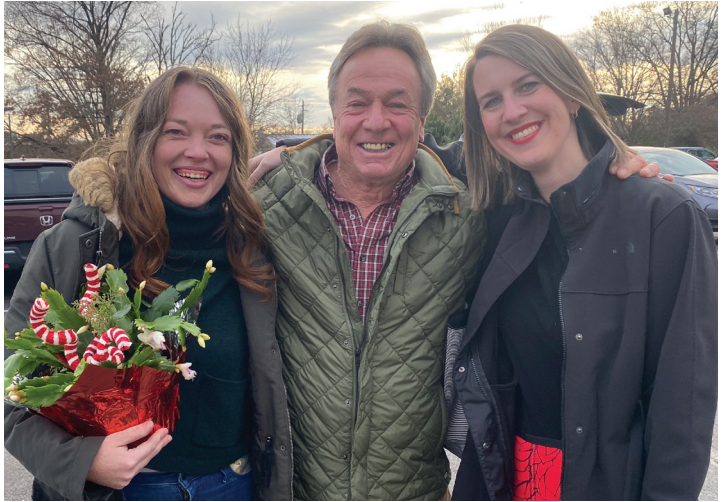
